Native Orchid of the Month—September

Spiranthes ovalis
(October lady's tresses)

Spiranthes ovalis (October lady's tresses) is a small herbaceous orchid that grows to approximately 8 to 16 inches in height. The two to four basal leaves are broad, oblong-elliptic to oblanceolate in shape. Leaves along the stem are 2 to 6 inches in length and are obtuse in shape.



From August through
November, terminal
flower spikes develop
and are somewhat
congested and slender
and are composed of
three or four vertical
files of small, pure white
flowers. The spikes are
tightly spiraled, usually 3
flowers per cycle of spiral.
The flowers are individually
widely spreading or
somewhat deflexed,
cylindric, white or the lip

creamy at the middle; sepal and lateral petals, the petal usually widest in the distal third and with one vein; lip about 1/16 inch, ovate-oblong, rounded distally, often somewhat constricted near the middle.





The habitat of *Sprianthes ovalis* is primarily calcareous soils in full sun or partial shade in moist forests, wooded pastures.
