Know What You Grow - Orchid Names and Pronunciations

Yes, it is beautiful, but learn to know what you are looking at.

Before you can determine how to care for your orchid, you must first be able to identify what kind of orchid you have. Most people who have just a few orchids will have a "moth orchid" or *Phalaenopsis* (fail-eh-NOP-sis)

If you have *Phalaenopsis* orchids, they probably came as a gift to someone and are either finished blooming, or the flowers are close to fading. Where to cut a *Phalaenopsis* inflorescence, or flower spike, is the #1 most frequently asked question.

Dendrobium(den-DROH-bee-um) is a very large and wide-spread genus, several types have impacted the pot plant market. These are popular because they are very flowery, and blooms can last several weeks.

Plants in the **Oncidium** family often have flowers that resemble dancing ladies. Many plants in this have very complex intergeneric backgrounds and a wide range of colors and shapes, blooms are usually smaller than other but can have numerous flowers on a spike/inflorescence/stem.

The *Cattleya* (CAT-lee-ah) family may very well have caught your eye - or nose! Many of these plants have delightful fragrances and can be irresistible. Cattleyas come in many sizes, shapes and colors on both big and small plants but can be recognized by their symmetrical flowers.

In Florida **Vanda** (VAN-duh) orchids and hybrids made from vandas are very popular because of their rainbow of colors and frequency of flowering.

Another popular house-plant genus is *Paphiopedilum* paff-ee-oh-PED-ih-lum) or lady slipper orchid. Like *Phalaenopsis*, *Paphiopedilum* plants have long-lived flowers. They are characterized by a slipper-like pouch.

Becoming comfortable and familiar with the Orchids listed is your foundation for buying, growing, and communicating with others in the orchid world.

Educators Program

Do you like teaching others about orchids? If your answer is "yes", the Education Committee is looking for you. We have several new projects that could benefit from people who are willing to share their expertise in different areas of orchid culture and care.

We are collaborating with the Pennsylvania Master Gardener Program to produce an online Master Orchid Series, tentatively titled, "Orchids for Everyone". The Education Committee will be creating six webinars/modules. The first will be an introduction to orchids (evolution, plant physiology, etc.) The second will cover the most popular genera of orchids that people grow, how to identify them, unique traits, and growth conditions for each type of orchid.

The third will be how to repot, mount, and divide orchids and all the different potting media and pots that can be used.

The fourth will be all about the care and culture of orchids (light, water, fertilizer, air movement, temperature, and also how to get them to rebloom). The fifth will cover troubleshooting and managing pests and diseases. Finally, the sixth will cover the native orchids of PA.

We have created a Youth Orchid Education Class that can be taught, in conjunction with the Stuck on Orchids sticker book. This can be presented at schools, botanic gardens, or orchid shows.

We are working with the Girl Scouts to create a national program to educate all three levels in their organization. It is proposed that we will use the Youth Orchid Education Classes for the Brownies, the Girl Scouts will create and host Kids Korners at local orchid shows, and the Cadets will work on native orchid conservation as well as orchid propagation.

Conservation of orchid species and their habitats has been a cornerstone of the AOS since our founding in 1921.

Conservation of orchid species and their habitats has been a cornerstone of the AOS since our founding in 1921. Through its members and staff, the Society plays a major role in the formulation of world orchid conservation opinion and policies. By working to save orchids and their habitats here and abroad, we preserve their beauty and important role in the planet's ecosystem.

The American Orchid Society grants awards for non-commercial conservation projects, as well as experimental projects of fundamental and applied research on orchids. The purpose of these grants is to advance the conservation and preservation of orchids in every aspect. Conservation projects supported have been in areas as diverse as CITES publication funding, a conservation program for an orchid reserve, establishment of a secretariat for the IUCN/OSG, and other informational resources.

Basic Orchid Culture



Mites

The key to being a successful grower is knowing your orchids' cultural requirements. Growing the same plant under different conditions can produce different effects. Whether a novice or a seasoned grower it is important to know which cultural factors can separate our plants from an award-winning plant.

Because of their size, mites are unnoticed until they have created considerable damage. "Mite damage makes plant's leaves look silvery, especially on the underside where the pests have killed the cells of the surface layer.... Most insecticides have little effect on mites."
